

The Gift of the Holy Spirit



Dear Parish Family,

The Lord Jesus, before his Ascension, entrusted to his Church a clear mission: “Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.” This command is not only a task to be accomplished, but a promise of divine assistance. The mission of the Church is carried forward in the power of the Holy Spirit.

At Pentecost, this promise is fulfilled. The Holy Spirit is poured out upon the Apostles, and the Church is born in mission. What was once closed by fear is opened by grace. What was divided by sin is gathered into unity. People of every language hear and proclaim the one Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Scriptures had already prepared us for this moment. Through the prophets, the Lord promised that he would pour out his Spirit upon all flesh, renewing his people from within. This gift is not external or symbolic; it is the very life of God given to dwell within the hearts of believers.

When the Son of God became man, he entered fully into our human condition. At his baptism, the Holy Spirit descended upon him, revealing that the Spirit comes to sanctify humanity from within and to restore what sin had wounded. In Christ, the Spirit is given to the world as the source of new life.

Saint Irenaeus reminds us that the Spirit prepares humanity as an offering to God. Without the Spirit, we remain divided and unable to become one body in Christ. But through baptism and the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are made one people, one Church, and one living communion in the Lord.

This unity is not abstract. It is lived concretely in the life of the Church:

- in our participation in the Eucharist, where we are formed into one Body;
- in our reconciliation with one another, where division gives way to peace;
- in our shared mission, where the Gospel is proclaimed in word and deed.

The Spirit of wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, and reverence for God continues to be poured out upon the Church. He strengthens us in faith, sustains us in trials, and renews us in charity.

The Reality We Face Today

We also recognize that we are living in a moment marked by real challenges. Many families carry heavy burdens—economic pressure, uncertainty about the future, and the struggle to maintain unity at home. At the same time, our society is increasingly marked by division, noise, and confusion, especially through the constant influence of social media, where truth and opinion are often mixed, and where anger too easily replaces dialogue.

In this context, many hearts grow tired. Some feel distant from the Church; others struggle to remain faithful in prayer; still others carry wounds of mistrust or disappointment. There is also a growing temptation to isolation—living connected digitally yet disconnected spiritually and relationally.

Yet it is precisely into this reality that the Holy Spirit is given. He is not distant from our struggles. He enters them. He strengthens what is weak, restores what is broken, and brings clarity where there is confusion. The Spirit does not remove us from the world’s difficulties; he transforms us within them.

Therefore, I encourage all the faithful of our parish community to renew their openness to the Holy Spirit in three concrete ways:

1. Return to prayer — especially invoking the Holy Spirit daily, asking for his guidance in our families, work, and decisions.
2. Deepen sacramental life — particularly through the Eucharist and Reconciliation, where the Spirit strengthens and restores us.
3. Commit to unity and charity — choosing forgiveness, patience, and active love within our communities, especially in moments of tension or misunderstanding.

Dear brothers and sisters, the Holy Spirit has been given to us not as a distant promise, but as a present reality. He dwells in the Church and in each baptized person. Through him, we bear the image of the Father and the Son, and we are called to live in a way that reflects that divine life.

May this same Spirit renew in us a living faith, strengthen our unity, and send us forth as joyful and courageous witnesses of the Gospel in today's world.
